


Program Information

Ph.D. Program Timeline





Additional Information

Advisor

- Every incoming graduate student is assigned a faculty member as his/her first year mentor and students are required to meet with their first-year mentors on a regular basis.
- Students should choose their long-term research advisor near the end of their first year or beginning of their second year.
- No Linguistics graduate students should be without a faculty advisor at any point in his/her progress through the program. The advisor will help a student plan his/her program and provide counsel on problems the student might have.
- It is possible to have 2 co-advisers, typically both Linguistics faculty. In exceptional cases, it may be possible to have 1 co-advisor be a faculty member from outside the Department of Linguistics.

Examinations

Qualifying Exam

Ph.D. Program


- All of the students in Ph.D. Program must take a qualifying exam.
- The qualifying exam must be taken at <u>the first</u> semester of the second year.
- The exam covers 3 areas: phonology, syntax, and semantics as well as some advanced topics related to student, dissertation.
- Students must maintain a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0.
- If students do not pass the exam, they are eligible to take the exam 3 times.
- If students DO NOT pass the exam within 3 times, they will be automatically disqualified from the graduate program.

Comprehensive Exam

M.A. Program

- <u>Students choosing Plan B M.A. Project</u> must take a comprehensive exam.
- The comprehensive exam must be taken at the end of the 2nd year.
- The exam covers 3 areas: phonology, syntax, and semantics as well as some advanced topics related to student, thesis.
- Students must maintain a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0.
- If students do not pass the exam, they are eligible to take the exam 3 times.
- If students DO NOT pass the exam within 3 times, they will be automatically disqualified from the graduate program.

Teaching Assistantships (TA) in Linguistics

Eligibility Requirements

- Must be a graduate student (M.A./Ph.D.) in Linguistics
- Minimum of 3.0 GPA
- Have a good behavior, attend university activities regularly, exhibit civic mindedness, have a
 good attitude towards the Program and the Department and must have financial problems

Regulations for Recipients of Scholarship

- Recipients must assist the Department of Linguistics with 90 hours during one academic year.
- Unless recipients follow the regulation as stated above, the Department will decide to terminate their scholarships.

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Eligibility Requirements

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Student complaint procedure

1. contact the individual instructor for issues about grades, exam procedures, absences, class policies, and so on.



2. If contact with the instructor proves unsatis-factory, discuss the problem with an academic advisor either by e-mail, phone, or face-to-face.



3. The advisor tries to resolve the problem in a straightforward, reasonable and prompt manner.



4. If attempts to resolve the problem informally have not been successful, complete a Student Complaint Form, and submit it to the program chair for a written record.

Student complaint procedure

5. To resolve the problem, you may be called for an interview about your complaint by the program chair.



6. If the chair is unable to resolve the problem, the problem will be brought to the department head.



7. The department head takes a prompt action by raising the issue in the agenda meeting for the executive board to handle the petition.



8. The department will issue a response to the student's complaint (normally within 2 weeks of the hearing).



9. In case the student still has a complaint, the problem will have to go to the dean along with written evidence.
